February 2024 Board Highlights

Academic Division One - School of Career and Technical Education

• John Morgan, Associate Vice President, Division One, says students in the Horticulture program are busy growing garlic as part of their restaurant production of produce for 5 local restaurants. Students raise and sell tomatoes, cucumbers, peppers, lettuce, herbs and garlic to the restaurants which includes El Paraiso and Essence, among others. The restaurants provide marketing of the YC program on their menus. It is win/win for YC and the restaurants.



• John Morgan reports the construction program at CTEC is busy completing two tiny homes for students at the Chino Center enrolled in the Line working program. The program is preparing to go to a one semester, 40 hours per week program beginning in the fall of 2024. The housing will be desperately needed to ensure that these students have a place to stay, which is compounded by the difficulties finding rentals for only one semester. The 300 square foot homes will feature a murphy bed, kitchen, living room, bathroom and closet. YC plans to build 30 of these tiny homes at the Chino Center, 15 of which will be stick built, and 15 3D printed.

• **Dr. Tiffany Kragnes**, Associate Professor of Law, was published in the Journal of Colorado Policing as co-author to *Carrying Handguns: Permit or Not to Permit is the Question.* Dr. John Reese and Dr. Kragnes discussed the various states' laws regarding "right to carry" and "shall issue" concealed carry permits for handgun, addressing the 2022 United States Supreme Court ruling issued in *New York State Rifle & Pistol Association, Inc., v. Bruen.*

• Andrea Pope, Spanish Instructor at Prescott High School and Yavapai College Dual Enrollment, states her Spanish Student's fluidity of speech when reading aloud has improved significantly since the beginning of Spanish 101 and Spanish 201 in August 2023. Andrea informally measures this by how many times the students laugh or pause as they read, and how many times she corrects their pronunciation. Additionally, she hears fewer groans from the students when asking them to read aloud.

 The YC Horticulture students propagated, seeded and transplanted before the fall term ended. Students were forcing tulips, propagating burros' tail and transplanting stock and snapdragons in the outdoor beds. Only in AZ, can we grow beautiful cut flowers outside in December! These items will be sold or on display in the Verde Cafe.





Twelve YC Viticulture and Enology (VEN) students will attend the Unified Wine and Grape Symposium in Sacramento. This event is the largest gathering of wine industry professionals in North America, offering a comprehensive insight into the latest trends and research in grape growing and winemaking. The symposium features an extensive trade show and educational sessions. This experience is invaluable for our students, allowing them to network with industry experts and gain new knowledge. In addition to the symposium, students will take a short side trip to NovaVine which is the nursery that supplied the plant material for our vinevard.



VEN students have begun blending trials for the 2023 wines. This complex process includes conducting tasting trials, assessing our current inventory, and determining the appropriate number of cases for each blend. Next, the students will be involved in label design, wine naming, and creating detailed sell sheets that include vital wine statistics. This year, they will complete this process for over 25 distinct wines. An essential aspect of this exercise is considering the most suitable sales channels for these wines, which include our tasting room, wine club, and various wholesale accounts.









- Vineyard Management and Pruning is underway in our vineyard. The task of long pruning is the first step in removing last year's old growth. Once this step is complete, students and staff plan the final pruning to coincide with the expected date of bud break. Over the next three months, they will prepare the vines for the new growing season. VEN students are also pleased to report that this off-season has benefited our vineyard. The rain and snow provide excellent conditions for soil nourishment and vine health.
