
Academic Division 3 – Visual Arts

• Ben McKee, 3D Design Instructor, reports students have been using a piece of software called Gravity Sketch in a Visual Reality (VR) project. Gravity Sketch allows students to blend 3D sketching along with geometric and freeform 3d modeling to create diverse designs ranging from traditional sculptures, fashion designs, and architectural visualizations all rendered and explorable in VR. Their work and experiences have highlighted a practical and fun application of new VR technology and equipment in art education and design.



• **Dr. Bryan Robertson**, 2D Visual Arts Instructor, says every spring, Yavapai College's Visual Arts Department throws open its doors to aspiring high school painters, sculptors, printmakers, woodworkers and metal and digital artists. The event called "Experience the Arts" allows students to test their instincts, challenge their expressive powers, and leave with a personal project or two, and a deeper appreciation of the arts. This year, Art Department faculty and staff guided 94 students from area High Schools in several artistic disciplines, including single-plate printmaking, acrylic painting technique, jewelry-making and lapidary, and wood veneer. Using an iPad, the students created moving images, Raku pottery, a collaborative exploration of surrealistic creativity, and sculpture with found objects.

The conference was well attended with over 200 participants from across the state and the country. Dr. Doug Berry set the stage with an inspirational welcome on day one. Megan Crossfield, Manager of Academic Initiatives at YC and the current OERizona Board President, also announced sustainability plans by leveraging the Open Textbooks for Rural Arizona federal grant. Plans include a <u>formal</u> <u>rebrand and website</u>, a <u>statewide shared OER repository</u>, a statewide community of practice email group, and formalizing the network's structure to include official board members and institutional representatives. The OERizona Network will be kicking off this new structure with an in-person leadership summit scheduled to take place June 5-6 at






Feedback from social media for the Yavapai College Greenhouse Café (YCGC):








Viticulture and Enology

- A new bottle labeler is on its way! Did you know that the students design their own labels for their




production? They can also enter their unique label designs in the Emerging Winemakers Competition & Symposium in April for award recognition.








Patty McMullen-Mikles Art Gallery It's the Little Things Small Works Art Fundraiser
